1. Introduction of Artist

Ming-Wei Lee, born in Taiwan in 1964, has been living in New York and Paris for many years. He is renowned internationally for creating participatory art with a public-facing and interactive nature. Lee's artistic practice revolves around the concept of participatory installations that incorporate mechanisms for audience interaction, allowing strangers to explore themes such as trust, intimacy, and self-awareness. His work seeks to examine the public and private nature of memory and emotion. Within the thematic frameworks he constructs, audience members engage in a series of experiential behaviors that draw from their personal histories, ultimately lending the work its full meaning.

Ming-Wei Lee's "participatory art" is an innovative and thought-provoking form of artistic practice that not only breaks down the traditional boundaries between art and audience but also turns the audience into one of the main subjects of the artwork, creating a more organic and dynamic interaction between art and viewers. Through this interaction, the audience can unleash their imagination and creativity and collaboratively create a lively and vibrant artwork with the artist.

As curators, inspired by Ming-Wei Lee's creative approach, we aim to create a platform that utilizes sound, text, and visual art, which are easily accessible forms of art, to help the audience find subtle connections between people. We hope to connect the immigration situation in Hong Kong with the global COVID-19 pandemic, encouraging the audience to delve deeper into these issues while experiencing the emotional and spiritual insights that art can bring.

We believe that through this two-way organic interaction, art can exist in our lives more diversely and openly, no longer limited to one-way presentation or expression. Our compaign is designed to help the audience gain a deeper understanding of art and make art more accessible to people's lives and needs, making it a more universal and natural existence.





2 Reasons for choosing the artist

• Criteria 1: Reflections on Migration

Born in Taiwan in 1964, Ming-Wei Lee spent six summers as a teenager studying Buddhism at a Zen monastery in Taiwan, then at the age of 14 he was sent to a Catholic Benedictine high school in San Francisco, and now lives in New York and Berkeley, California. This multi-location experience has shaped one of the key qualities of his personal artwork, which is emigration. Most of his works reflect the emotional and psychological impact of his immigration and cross-cultural identity - homelessness, isolation, loss, and the ensuing deeper perceptions of personal connections to the world, such as family, friendliness, kinship, or memory. For example, in his previous work project "Moving Garden", he had asked museum visitors to give the flowers they received to a stranger they met on the way, emphasizing the emotional connection between the individual and the outside world during the physical action of the body. This quality is very much in line with the attributes of Hong Kong as a colonized city with a complex and unstable demographic structure, and a liberal immigration policy that has often described Hong Kong as a "city of immigrants", home to Chinese, British, other European and South Asian communities. This historical and practical background has led to identity anxiety among many Hong Kong people, and "Remnants and Immigrants" has been an important commemorative theme in the 20th anniversary of Hong Kong's handover, sharing the immigrant nature of Hong Kong's art. However, most of the thinking about Hong Kong's immigrant nature is still focused on group memory, and the arrival of Lee Ming Wei can make individuals with cross-cultural identities think more deeply about immigrant nature, such as our envisioned A Manuscript Gift For Who U Miss activity, which invites new immigrants in Hong Kong or people whose friends or relatives have immigrated outside, to deepen their memories and identity through letters. The event invites new immigrants to Hong Kong, or those whose friends or relatives have emigrated, to deepen their memory and identity through letters, and to reflect on their connection to the outside.

• Criteria 2: Intimate dialogue

Hong Kong lifted the restrictions on the mask order in March this year, and people in Hong Kong, who have officially entered the post-epidemic era, face a return to more intimate communication after three years of conversations under the mask. However, the defensiveness and restraint caused by the long-standing restrictions, and the developed socialization methods of electronic technology have become resistance to allowing people in

Hong Kong to communicate and dialogue more intimately and authentically. Against this background, we look forward to the arrival of Lee Ming Wei to help people in Hong Kong break down old boundaries in their social relationships, draw closer to others, and achieve truly intimate communication. In Lee's previous artworks, he has often excelled in interacting with strangers in many novel ways, allowing participants to persist in a dialogue that is actively created, enriching the original shape of the exhibition while having a more open public orientation. For example, in the artwork "The Bloom of Sound", he invites the audience to listen to Schubert's "Song Series" together and explore the inner peace. Hong Kong's local art scene also has many artworks that invite audiences to participate in interactive works, such as the immersive interactive opera "Lana" presented by the Hong Kong Arts Festival, which is still mainly an effort to explore a more diversified way of integrating art and technology. Li Mingwei's art creations, on the other hand, allow individuals to have a deeper and more intimate dialogue with themselves and others in a more lifelike context. As we envisioned in A Sonic Gift For U, using Hong Kong's classic music as the medium of content, combined with the rich resources of local street performers in Hong Kong, to break the existing life pattern of passers-by just passing by and listening to songs, but to participate in the atmosphere of street singing, more intimate and open to experience a new process of communication with people.

Criteria 3: Building Trust

Based on the complex social environment and hectic pace of life in Hong Kong, even with boundary-pushing social behaviors, it is still difficult to say that we can make strangers trust each other with goodwill. Hong Kong curator Chan Hiu-kwan has done a curatorial project called "Strangers", which explores the concept of "home" in modern society in the form of an artist's book, thus exploring the possibility of cross-media communication and presenting images with personal experience and memory interpretation. But instead of a broad range of Hong Kong citizens, the project involves five female art practitioners, engaging in a dialogue between them and demonstrating their trust in each other. The creations of Li Mingwei tend to focus on the concept of the universal stranger. Our art project invites people to paint together, not limited to a single discussion, but to explore the core essence of daily events through various daily routines, such as food, clothing, housing, and sleep, and any moods they wish to express. This leads to a more authentic self-expression among strangers and builds a basic but rare trust in interpersonal society.

3. Main Projects

The epidemic has created a "new distance" between people. The long-term online communication and mask wearing have severely reduced face-to-face interaction and emotional communication among daily lives. On March 1st, 2023, the Hong Kong SAR Government has canceled the mask order that had been in place for nearly three years. Under this new environmental shift, Hong Kong citizens tend to crave for more intimate dialogue and communication. We look forward to work with Lee Ming-wei to build a platform for Hong Kong citizens to reconstruct trust and closer social distance.

3.1 A Sonic Gift For U

· Type of Activity: Participatory Art

· Participants: Mingwei Lee, Hong Kong Street musicians, Hong Kong Public


• Background and Purpose: During the 1980s and 90s, Hong Kong was in the golden age of its pop culture. Even now, the influence of Cantonese pop music is still far and wide. When you hurry along the streets of Mong Kok or Tsim Sha Tsui Underground Channel, do you notice those buskers singing those songs soulfully? Do you just pass by? Give a quick glance? Stop for a while? Or wait until they finish singing and applaud? Maybe you are too shy to respond, or maybe those buskers hope to get the response from you, even just an eye contact. Music can become a bridge to connect and narrow the relationship between people. This activity will connect those unknown Hong Kong buskers with local citizens through artists Mingwei Lee, and build a platform for strangers to communicate and get closer to each other.

· Time: 2 Days, 3h each day

· Content:

Mingwei Lee will select several classic Hong Kong music from the 1980s and 2000s respectively according to his impression of Hong Kong. Before his arrival in Hong Kong, he will contact and select a group of Hong Kong street musicians to participate in through our team.

On the event day, Mingwei Lee will pick participants from the streets randomly, then ask a question: Can I give you a present? If the offer is taken, Lee will invite them to the seat (a chair), he/she can choose one of the post-80s and post-00s song lists provided by Lee. After the song, participants can sing a piece of Cantonese song they like as a gift to the buskers and Lee, and share their feelings after listening to the performance. By reflecting the background of the times through the small cut of "Hong Kong Music" and leading the audience to revisit the music of the years, the aim of promoting communication through music is achieved.





· Location and Reason: West Kowloon Waterfront Promenade(西九龙海滨长廊). As a landmark of Hong Kong, the promenade shows the natural sea view of Hong Kong. It is located in one of the most bustling area of Hong Kong with a large flow of public. Also, outdoor site can save the cost of rental(compare to inside venue).



3.2 A Manuscript Gift For Who U Miss

· Type of Activity: Participatory Art

· Participants: Mingwei Lee, Citizens whose relatives or friends have emigrated or long lived overseas

• Background and Purpose: With the emergence of modern mobile phones, computers, and other technology products. Although they can facilitate contact with people far away in a foreign land, there are always words that are difficult to say. Traditional handwriten letter have great charm and should not be forgotten by the times since it is more sincere and full of affection because they are written by hand. This activity aims to attract people who have relatives or friends far away from Hong Kong or who are new immigrants to Hong Kong to participate. Through writting letters, participants can express their feelings and show the emotional and psychological impact of immigration and cross-cultural identity.

· Time: 1 week

· Content:

Continue with the creative concept of Lee's "The letter writing project (魚雁計畫)", four tents will be set up on the Great Lawn of the West Kowloon Arts Park. No more than one people can enter the tent at a time. Each participant had one hour in there. Once they are inside of the tent, they can put on noise-canceling headphones (white noise and soft music will be played in the headphones to help immerse and relax) and write letters to their friends or family in faraway places. As the hour approaches, staff will enter the tent to whisper a reminder. Letters collected will be sent out at the end. At the same time, we will start an Instagram hashtag #AManuscriptGiftForWhoULove, where participants can share their photos and feelings about the event, and recipients can share the content of the letters they received.

· Location: The Great Lawn of the West Kowloon Arts Park. Large, open space with no too much rental fee.

ps. The tents will be placed in quieter areas of the park, with additional staff around the perimeter to remind people passing by to cooperate with us to keep things quiet and provide a nice environment for the participants.

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3.3 A Painterly Gift For Who U Meet At First

· Type of Activity: Workshop

• Participants: Mingwei Lee, 20 randomly selected registrants

• **Purpose:** In the form of paintings and relaxed workshops, give participants a way to share their personal memories and emotional expressions, and discuss the "public and private nature of memory and emotion" with Lee, which he has been studying and exploring in his work.

• **Time:** 1 Day (3h)

· Content:

At the initial stage, the workshop's activities will be advertised and 20 people will be randomly selected to participate among the registered citizens. On the day of the event, the organizer will collect all participants' electronic devices (including cell phones, electronic watches, etc.) and participants will enter in turn into a closed

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compartment set up with a drawing board containing a street scene of Hong Kong drawn by Lee in advance. Each person will be required to draw something that best represents them personally, taking into account their recent moods, thoughts, encounters, etc. (no more than 5 minutes per person), and eventually create a painting together. People who have not yet participated in the painting or have completed it are free to chat with those around them of their choice. If you are a bit socially scared and don't know how to start a chat, it's okay, we will also prepare some topic cards, like today's weather. Yes, why not start talking about weather?

After all the participants have finished their drawings, we will present the work in front of everyone. Lee will ask questions based on the parts of the painting that interest him, and the participant mentioned will answer the meaning or reason of what they drew, or even guess what the elements on the side mean where they drew. How does it relate to what you drew? Guess who painted it?

At the end of the event, the staff will make a photocopy of the artwork created by everyone and give it to 20 participants. Through this workshop, people will be able to create an emotional connection with strangers within 3 hours.

· Location: M+ 's Hall
